General Orders No. 09

2021-2022 Series

1. Attention is directed to Section 217 of the **National Bylaws, Nomination, Election, Installation and Term of Office.** *Post officers shall be nominated, elected and installed as prescribed in Section 217 of the Manual of Procedure.*

Manual of Procedure, Section 217, Nomination, Election, Installation and Term of Office:

Nomination: *Nominations of Post Officers shall open in March and remain open until the Post is ready to vote, provided, however that when a poll system is used, as hereinafter described, nominations must be closed at the meeting prior to the election to allow the Adjutant to prepare a printed ballot.*

Election: *Post Officers shall be elected in April. Balloting for Post officers may be conducted by open vote or written secret ballot (handwritten or printed) at a regular Post meeting, or, if required by Post Bylaws or authorized by Post vote prior to the opening of nominations, by a poll system. Absentee ballots and proxy votes are prohibited.*

2. Attention is directed to: **National By-Laws, Sec 222, Delegates, District Convention & Meetings, Department and National Conventions:** provides that (a) delegate strength shall be one for every thirty members or fraction thereof in good standing. (b) Delegates elected under this section shall not be considered instructed and may exercise full authority in the duty to be performed. (c) Each Post will pay, in accordance with its Department ByLaws, a delegate registration fee for each and every delegate to which the Post shall be entitled. (d) Each Post will pay, in advance, a National Convention registration fee of twenty-five dollars (\$25) which shall entitle the Post to a packet of convention information and materials and one identified register delegate for the National Convention

Pursuant to MOP, Sec 222, Delegates and alternates for the District Convention and Meetings, Department and National Conventions shall be elected a regular meeting in April. Delegate strength will be based on members in good standing as of March 31st. Delegate and alternates of each Post shall serve as delegates throughout the year provided, they remain members in good standing in the respective Post within the District.

3. Proof of Eligibility Requirements for Officers: All Posts, Districts and Departments should be reminded of the provisions of Sections 216, 416, and 516 of the Manual of Procedure that officers, elected and appointed, shall not be installed or assume the duties of their office until proof of eligibility has been submitted to the respective Adjutant and properly reviewed.

4. Commanders on all levels are reminded that according to Section 105 of the National Bylaws, a member whose dues are unpaid after their anniversary date ceases to be a member in good standing and loses all rights of membership in the Veterans of Foreign Wars. They shall not attend meetings or conventions and shall not participate in Post, County Council, District, Department or National functions.

How to Destroy a Post in 22 easy steps

Many posts have issues. Some are easy to fix, while others may take time. A post is a living organization, it needs its members to stay viable and healthy. It needs members to hold office, manage programs, seek new members, and keep the ones that have joined. It needs members to become involved. A post is so much more than an organization. It is a refuge, a haven, a place where a combat vet can meet and talk to others with the same experience. This is expressively why it is important to have post-military outlets life like the VFW.

It is important to have a place where you feel comfortable sharing your feeling and can allow for healing. *Your post* can provide that type of sanctuary; however, to do so, your post must provide an open and welcoming atmosphere. Here are 22 ways to destroy your post.

1. Don't ever attend the Post meetings.
2. If you do come, don't get there on time and don't pay attention.
3. Don't support the work being done by the officers and other members.
4. Don't accept an office and don't congratulate others on their good work.
5. Don't attend committee meetings if you get appointed to a work group.
6. Don't give your opinions on matters, then disagree with everything after the meeting.
7. Don't join in when others roll up their sleeves to hold events and membership outreach.
8. Don't pay your dues early so your comrades have to chase you down.
9. Don't bother about getting new members. Let the Commander or Adjutant do it.
10. Don't take corrective actions when your home association tries to run the Post.
11. Don't remind others that only regular VFW members can serve on the association's board.
12. Don't give anything back to the Post while enjoying membership benefits.
13. Don't cooperate with other members and officers but expect them to cooperate with you.
14. Don't pitch in when volunteers are needed; just blame the officers for failed programs.

15. Don't reach out to invite younger members to join your Post.
16. Don't call or visit members who have not renewed their dues.
17. Don't welcome new members and don't invite them into your family of veterans.
18. Don't make changes to your post that will make your facilities and events family friendly.
19. Don't ask new and younger members to take on a leadership role in you Post.
20. Don't support the efforts of the leadership appointed to lead the Post.
21. Don't point out mistakes but never offer a solution that will benefit the Post.
22. Don't ever point the finger at yourself.

One issue that we must confront in our organization is to accept that a barrier that blocks our progress to attract and retain new members can be directed to prior behaviors, attitudes, and actions that contaminate our Post and relationships within the organization.

Another issue is not looking towards the future. Statements like "We have always done it that way" or not wanting to change creates stagnation. Complaining that a veteran from today has not paid their dues also does nothing but create resentment. It chases younger members into other organizations.

So how do we fix it? Let's allow time for creative dialogue amongst the membership both seasoned and new, inviting others to ask questions and share emotions, experiences, and insights will lead to success. Running a Post takes involvement from all members and working together will add to Post unity.

Heading In the Right Direction

Staying Informed and communicate:

It's important to understand that your individual efforts as members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars are generally driven by a need to make a difference. You have likely chosen to volunteer your services based upon your desire to help those who cannot help themselves. In our organization, we have a saying "Still Serving", and it is absolutely true; however, your ability to fulfill that statement is based upon the knowledge of information shared amongst the membership.

It is important to be provided with most current and updated information regarding the organization as having those tools will help you support the overall goal of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and most importantly how to make a difference in our community. The best way to getting to that information is to attend Post meetings. In post meetings the Commander will share communications given to him from District, Department and National which will govern the organizations future.

As the largest and oldest war veterans service organization, we have a long history of supporting service members, veterans, and their families. We must get and stay organized to achieve the success we need to complete tasks and stay on top of things to be done, such as, attending local events, townhalls, etc. in order to truly make a difference within our communities.

We can also help veterans in our community by:

1. *Welcoming our younger veterans, they have answered the call, same as us.*
2. Volunteering at a shelter.
3. Being a mentor or legal aid.
4. Organizing a Stand Down program.
5. Developing a veteran burial program in your area.
6. Helping Veterans get to and from medical appointments.

7. Providing a stand in lifeline for Vets whose families live far away.
8. Help with Veteran Outreach Programs that assist Homeless Veterans and those with PTSD.
9. Recruiting and retaining Women Veterans and giving insight to their views of the VFW.
10. *Being active in your post, think outside the box of ways to help veterans, families, and communities.*

Remember, of all these things we can do to help others, we need to apply them to ourselves in order to be our own savior. Trust in your brotherhood and don't be afraid to ask for help. Moving forward is not possible without you and communication cannot, nor should it ever be a one-way street.



Without a doubt, we are stronger as individuals and as an organization when we spend time in comradeship and speak out for our VFW, learn more about our organization, and conduct the business of our organization. As many of you witnessed, we had a great representation of our Voice of Democracy, Patriot Pen, and Teacher of the Year recipients. However, let us not forget our Public Servant Award recipients as well. We had a great showing of Law Enforcement Officers, Fire Fighters, and Emergency Medical Technician recipients attend our joint session on Saturday morning as well. A special thanks should go out to each of you at Post, District and Department levels, both on the VFW and the Auxiliary side for once again making these programs successful in the Department of Oklahoma. And of course, let us all thank the committee chairpersons and committee members at all levels who selflessly put forward the efforts to make these programs happen.

As I have stated before and continue to state, that as your National Council Member, it is my goal and desire to always represent you, speak out for you, and do what we believe is best for the VFW Department of Oklahoma within our National organization. I want to thank each of you who let me know your thoughts.

As many of you know, one of the hottest topics at the National level is the retirement of Quartermaster General Debra Anderson.

Election of a Quartermaster General:

I have previously sent out an email showing Debra's announcement of her retirement as Quartermaster General effective March 2nd at close of business. Therefore, pursuant to National Bylaws & MOP Sec. 620, the National Council of Administration will be elect a Quartermaster General to fill the vacancy until our next National Convention. I asked you the membership of our department how you wanted me to cast my vote, and from the two candidates, Past Commander-in-Chief Hal Roesch and Assistant Quartermaster General Marc Garduno, the majority of you have chosen Marc Garduno. Therefore, I will cast my vote for Marc Garduno.

National Legislative Conference: Unfortunately, again this year, due to COVID restrictions, the National Legislative Conference and the Voice of Democracy Parade of Winners will be in virtual settings. This is unfortunate for us, because it is important for our Senators and Representatives on Capital Hill to see us and hear from us face to face!

The Commander-in-Chief's Testimony will be held virtually from the Hyatt Regency on Wednesday, 2nd March at 1400hrs eastern time in which I will be in attendance. I have not yet seen on our National Website if anyone can join in virtually. However, it might be posted soon. On Monday there will be a Life Member Committee Meeting and Tuesday the Budget & Finance Committee meeting. While not a member of either of these committees, I plan on attending.

Voice Of Democracy Parade of Winners:

The VFW will be hosting its second annual virtual Voice of Democracy Parade of Winners live on April 7 at 7 p.m. CDT, live on Facebook.

Join us as VFW and VFW Auxiliary state and national leadership, a representative from program sponsor [Twisted X](#), and this year's 52 Voice of Democracy Department (state) winners come together from all over the world as we crown the 2022 national Voice of Democracy first place winner.

Be sure to [visit the VFW Facebook page, select the Virtual Parade of Winner event, tap "interested," then "going" to ensure you stay up-to-date and receive all event notifications and reminders.](#)

Furthermore, it is great for our department Voice of Democracy to go to Washington D.C. and see for themselves where our Nation conducts its business as a republic. As of today, I am being told that even the Commander-in-Chief's Testimony before Congress has a pretty good chance of being conducted via tele-conference versus in person.

National Legislative Service:

- VA has proposed changes to its Schedule for Rating Disabilities for auditory, respiratory, and mental health conditions. These changes would incorporate modern medical data and terminology, allowing veterans to receive disability ratings based on the most current information. Ratings of veterans who currently receive VA disability compensation will not be impacted as a result of these changes. The VFW will carefully review the proposed changes and will submit a public comment to the Federal Register. [Read more.](#)
- The VFW, alongside fellow veteran advocates, met with Department of Education Secretary Dr. Miguel Cardona to discuss education issues facing veterans, service members, and their families. The VFW expressed the need for transparent and accessible data about institutions to facilitate informed decision making. Secretary Cardona relayed his department's dedication to improving higher education accessibility and affordability, as well as improving collaboration with DOD and VA.

- The VFW currently [supports 147 bills; and opposes one bill](#) pending before the 117th Congress.

- NVS VFW's Pre-Discharge Claims Representatives hosted a series of benefit briefings for separating service members around the country this week to include U.S. Naval Academy and Joint Base Andrews.
- NVS participated in a bimonthly Wounded Warrior Project meeting, discussing the ongoing grant support that the VFW receives to operate our VFW Pre-Discharge program on military installations around the country. NVS anticipates that the grant will continue in 2022-2023.
- NVS participated in a discussion with VA to promote the fielding of their new mobile application for mental health called Getting Ready in Transition (GRIT). The app will connect the veteran with a support team of their choosing and also provides exercise and insights for better mental health. NVS is working with VA to ensure that resources like the VFW's global network of service officers are properly integrated into the app.
- The NVS health care team participated in a discussion on the Comprehensive Program for Caregiver Assistance with Veterans Health Administration.

Comrades,

If you attended the Mid-Winter Council of Administration meeting, you are aware that the Oklahoma VFW Foundation made a \$5,000 donation to the Dept. of Oklahoma VFW for their service officer program. These are actually funds that were donated to the OK VFW Foundation from the Vietnam Veterans Association Chapter 216 (Tulsa) last year and were earmarked specifically for the VFW Service Officer program. The Foundation worked closely with Dept. Quartermaster Watts on the timing of making this donation from the Foundation to the VFW to ensure that this donation did not jeopardize any other grants the VFW receives for their Service Officer work.

We have received many questions about funding Honor Guards and the Foundation board met during Mid-Winter and we will be establishing grants very soon. Honor Guards can apply for small grants on a service-by-service basis. After an Honor Guard performs a service for one of our departed comrades, they can fill out a very simple application which will be on the Foundation's website (www.okvfwfoundation.org) on or before March 1st. Grants will start out relatively small, only \$25 per service, because the Foundation currently only has \$900 in its Honor Guard fund and we want to make sure we can fund as many Honor Guards as possible. Watch for Foundation fundraisers for the Honor Guard program. As our available funds increase, our Board will be able to reevaluate the amount of these grants.

As always, the Foundation is here to assist VFW Posts and Auxiliaries if they find grants or have corporations who want to donate to them but are only able to donate to a 501(c)(3). In the last few months, with the assistance of Comrade Gary Miles, the Foundation was able to do a \$5,000 pass through donation to help fund the Ponca City Veterans Parade and did another pass-through donation of over \$7,000 from a private individual to fund a new flag pole for a community center in Kay County.

Comrades,

First of all, I hope all is well with you and you are staying warm in this cold weather. We had a decent turnout at the Mid-Winter legislative training and briefing. We were cramped on time, but I hope those in attendance received some good information. Of the seven members of our Congressional delegation, we had a video from Congressman Hern, and staff from Congressman Lucas' and Bice's offices. Not the showing we were hoping for, but it is a busy time in Congress right now.

Beginning on the 28th of February and running through the 2nd of March will be the National Legislative Conference. We will again be conducting the conference virtually. Currently, we plan to meet with Senator Inhofe, Congressman Lucas, Congressman Hern and Congresswoman Bice. We received a video from Congressman Cole because he is wrapped up on the Appropriations Committee and will not be able to attend. We still have not heard from Sen. Lankford or Congressman Mullin. If there is anything military or veteran related that you would like to communicate to those we are meeting with, please do not hesitate to pass it on to myself. We will get it to them when we meet with them.

If you have not heard by now, our biggest ally in the Senate when it comes to our military, veterans and their families, Senator James Mountain Inhofe, is announcing his retirement at the end of this current congress in January of 2023. Because of the ways the Oklahoma election laws are structured, there will be a special election to fill the seat during the normal November elections this year.

There is currently an Action Alert out that I strongly urge everyone to participate in. Here is the information on it:

Vote YES on Honoring Our PACT Act

Background

The *Honoring our PACT Act* is a comprehensive solution to provide access to VA health care and benefits to toxic-exposed veterans. This historic legislation would help millions of veterans by establishing a permanent presumptive framework to address any toxic exposure, foreign or domestic, past, present, and future. It would provide VA health care access for all veterans exposed to hazards, create a concession of exposure for airborne toxins, and establish a list of presumptive conditions associated with burn pits and other exposures. This legislation would help Post-9/11 veterans, K2 veterans, Atomic veterans, and Vietnam veterans, including those who served in Thailand, Cambodia, and Laos. We urge the House to pass the *Honoring our PACT Act* as soon as it is brought to the floor.

Take Action

Contact your representative and tell them to vote **YES** as soon as the *Honoring our PACT Act* is brought to the House floor. Toxic-exposed veterans cannot afford to wait any longer for health care and benefits. We must act now!

[Senate Committee Advances Bill for Post-9/11 Toxic-Exposed Vets](#): The Senate Committee on Veterans' Affairs unanimously passed the Health Care for Burn Pit Veterans Act, introduced by Chairman Jon Tester (D-Mont.) and Ranking Member Jerry Moran (R-Kan.). The VFW-supported legislation would extend VA health care eligibility for combat veterans from five to ten years after separation from the military. The bill would require VA to screen veterans regarding their exposures during service, furnish training for VA health care providers and disability claims processors, and provide additional reporting and tracking of veteran health conditions due to toxic exposures. "This legislation is a step in the right direction to take care of this group of veterans and we look forward to additional expansions of health care and benefits to cover all toxic exposed veterans," said VFW National Legislative Director Pat Murray. [House Holds Hearing on Securing High-Demand Jobs for Veterans](#): The House Veterans' Affairs Subcommittee on Economic Opportunity held a hearing focused on the impact of new VA education and training programs such as [Veteran Employment Through Technology Education Courses](#) (VET TEC) and [Veteran Rapid Retraining Assistance Program](#) (VRRAP) in securing veteran employment. Since its launch in 2019, VET TEC has placed over 1,700 graduates in new employment, earning an average salary of \$60,000. It is currently a five-year pilot program, and the VFW continues to advocate for funding to support its success. Watch the hearing.


[Independent Budget Released](#): Leading veterans service organizations (VSOs) - Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW), DAV (Disabled American Veterans), and the Paralyzed Veterans of America (PVA)—have released [The Independent Budget \(IB\) Recommendations for the Department of Veterans Affairs \(VA\) for FY 2023 and FY 2024](#). This report serves as a roadmap to ensure VA is fully funded and capable of carrying out its mission to serve veterans and their families, both now and in the future. "For over 30 years, the IBVSOs have coauthored the IB, offering substantive solutions and policy recommendations to ensure the timely delivery of specialized health care, as well as appropriate earned benefits for the men and women who served," said Bob Wallace, executive director of VFW Washington Office.

“While this year’s report is now complete, it is now imperative Congress and VA work together, along with veterans service organizations and other veterans’ stakeholders to put veterans’ interests on the top of their list.”

House Holds Hearing on Survivor Benefits and Services: The House Veterans’ Affairs Subcommittee on Disability Assistance and Memorial Affairs held an oversight hearing on the effectiveness of VA services for dependents and survivors. VFW National Legislative Associate Director Kristina Keenan submitted a statement for the record explaining how VA needs to improve outreach to military and veteran families and better explain the benefits available to survivors. “Preplanning is key. Veterans and their families need to receive clear and continuous communications informing them of future benefits and the documentation needed to ensure that survivors are supported in the event of the veteran’s passing,” stated Keenan. She stressed that surviving family members are often unaware that the benefits they may be entitled to receive are significantly less than what veterans receive in disability compensation, resulting in unanticipated financial hardship. VA Proposes Disability Rating Changes: VA has proposed changes to its Schedule for Rating Disabilities for auditory, respiratory, and mental health conditions. These changes would incorporate modern medical data and terminology, allowing veterans to receive disability ratings based on the most current information. Ratings of veterans who currently receive VA disability compensation will not be impacted as a result of these changes. The VFW will carefully review the proposed changes and will submit a public comment to the Federal Register. [Read More](#).



possibly can for maximum participation. We thank you in advance for all your help and look forward to working with all of you. Take care and stay safe out there! Let the good times roll!



- Unmet Needs
- Military Assistance Program (MAP)
- VFW "Sport Clips Help a Hero Scholarship" program



- * Unmet Needs provides financial assistance to service members, veterans, and their families experiencing a financial hardship directly related to their military service.
- * Assistance, not a hand out.
- * The financial assistance is in the form of a one-time grant in an amount up to \$2,500. All grants are paid directly to the “creditor” companies (such as the electric company, mortgage company, landlord, etc.) and not to the individual.
- * Funds can be used for rent, car repairs, medical expenses, infant-care items and many other necessities.
- * Each case is reviewed individually and acceptance determined by a committee.
